

# AOA Executive Director's Report - 2023 Annual General Meeting

# Annual Reports and Plans

The AOA Board of Directors meets each year in February for a strategic planning session to both review how well we delivered on the goals set in the previous year and to map out our long- and short-term goals for the coming year.

A lot of work goes into making sure we are doing all we can to support orienteering in Alberta. A part of this is to ensure that we meet the Government of Alberta SPAR accountability requirements as SPAR is a major funder of Alberta orienteering. This includes evaluations, creating an annual roadmap, planning (and carrying out) programs and events, and reviewing policies.

## Funding

The AOA's finances are in good shape thanks to the extra grants and loan for pandemic support that helped us get through that challenging time. Last year our funding was very similar to the years before, with the main difference being that the casino grants were further apart, so those funds needed to be stretched over a longer period.

### 1. SPAR - AB Government Grant for Provincial Sport Organizations

By meeting all the criteria outlined in the Funding and Accountability Framework we have continued to receive our Sport, Physical Activity and Recreation (SPAR) grant from the province at similar levels to previous years.

- 2. <u>Casino:</u> our most recent casino was in August 2022, in Calgary. Our next casino is scheduled for the last quarter in 2024, to be held in Edmonton.
- 3. Other Grants:
  - Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan forgiveness

The \$20,000 forgiveness loan helped the organization cover the shortfall in income due to the closure of casinos due to the pandemic which resulted in longer times between casinos.

- City of Red Deer Community Development Grant We received a City of Red Deer grant of \$2000 to support the development of an orienteering community and club in Red Deer.
- Participaction Community Challenge grant
  \$500 was received to organize free-to-participants 'Try It' events in June.



#### 4. Other Revenue

#### • Fundraising

In 2022 we participated in the Government of Alberta <u>SPAR MATCHING DONATION FUND</u> <u>PROGRAM.</u> The Sport, Physical Activity and Recreation (SPAR) Donation Fund Program encouraged support for the development of sport, physical activity and recreation in Alberta. The program gave individual and corporate donors a tax incentive to invest in the future of the sector, and a process for the acceptance of contributions from charitable organizations.

Thank you to those who supported this with your donations!

AOA received \$5,125 in March 2023. All of the funds are being used as per the donors' requests.

#### • Events and program income

We run our programs and events on a non-profit basis, so we spend any income on those programs and events. If any income is left, we invest it into buying equipment or other ways to grow our activities.

### 2022 Activities in Review

#### **Highlights**:

Thanks to our clubs' volunteer organizers we held some big events in 2022.

- Major events that benefited the province and the whole orienteering community in Canada were:
  - **The Western Canadian Orienteering Championships (WCOC) is organized by FWOC**. It was a great success with well-mapped areas, challenging courses, and outstanding organization.
  - AOA supported the **Canadian Rockies Orienteering Festival** by providing ongoing help for mapping, and administrative support for WCOC, COC, and Barebones.

### We had 1726 individual registrations through 11 events.

- Additionally, AOA created the Barebones Crowsnest Pass map and helped with the Sass Peepre training camp.
- EOOC organized the Orienteering Canada team selection sprint races in the spring. The U of A campus was wonderful for urban sprints and many compliments were received on the courses. Lots of volunteer hours went into the organization of these races for the Canadian Team and was a huge help for the sport;
- In-person events returned in the form of youth programs, and outreach programs.
- AOA organized "Try it!" sessions with the collaboration of local clubs. It was very successful, with 270 new participants, and resulted in some new members;
- AOA outreach membership grew to 118, mainly in Red Deer and Airdrie;
- AOA school programs were popular with 1421 participants.
- No community coaching courses were held in Alberta in 2022 as there were no new requests, but we held one in Saskatchewan to train their coaches and a learning facilitator. We are very proud of our continuing support of the new Saskatchewan Orienteering Association;
- Mapping projects were less active but still ongoing. Thank you to Teresa W. for helping with the outreach mapping and Don B. for completing the Barrier Lake mapping project. EOOC's renewed map near Bruderheim was completed this year by Geraint E.;
- Officials' certification was moved online. Huge thanks to Marion O. who volunteered to administer this and give guidance to new officials. The courses were back to in person in 2023 and we were happy to see the O300 course planners' course in March.



- AB Park permit update: We made some significant progress regarding AB park Bow Valley Orienteering events permits AB Parks, Kananaskis Region, in consultation with FWOC and AOA, has developed an excellent Orienteering Directive that should facilitate getting permits in the Kananaskis region. Once our maps have been reviewed by the ecological lead on the AB Kananaskis team (the last step in a multi-year process), we should be able to offer more forest events on some of our favourite maps. The Directive also makes it easier to create and use new maps. We can't thank Kitty Jones enough for devoting years to spearheading this effort since 2015.
- Collaboration to share information and resources and support the orienteering community, remain a high priority for the AOA. This included ongoing involvement with Orienteering Canada's national team selection policy workgroup.
