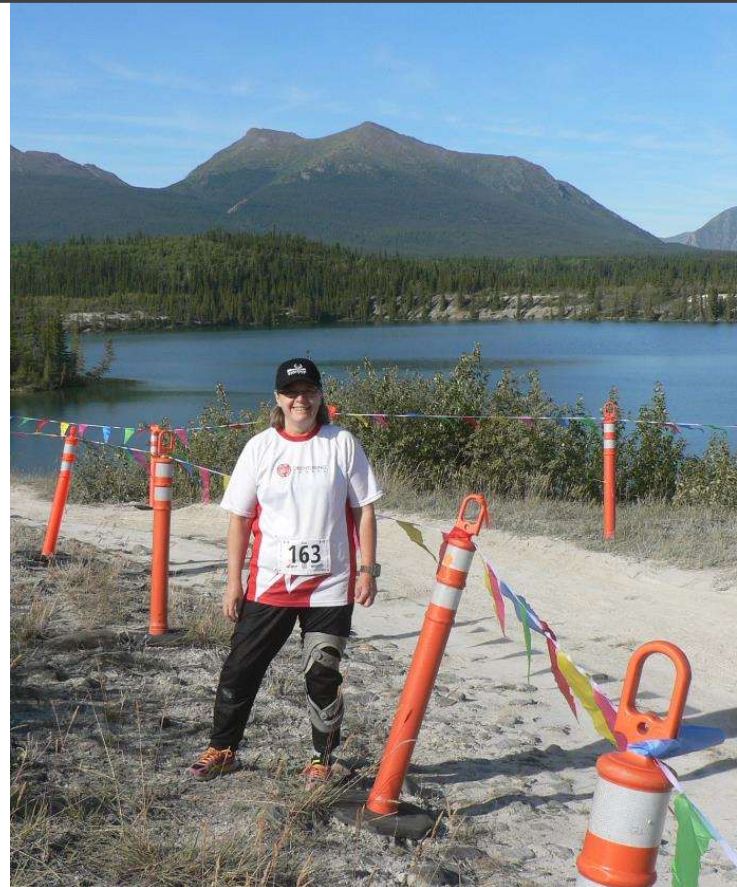

If you had one tip for young orienteers what would it be? Make as many mistakes as you can, as soon as you can. It's your mistakes that teach you about your physical and mental boundaries. In my opinion when you're learning to orienteer you should be much more proud of a race with 75% awesome splits and 25% terrible ones than a race that is filled with splits that you know you could have run faster.

**How do you normally prepare for an important race?** I try to become

well acquainted with the terrain long before the actual race. Sometimes this means watching others' GoPro footage, viewing GPS tracks of competitors or starting to visualize myself running in the terrain. If possible, I try and do a couple of training camps in neighbouring terrain and to have a short taper before the race so that my mind and body are ready to perform at their best.

## FINANCIALS

Despite the impacts of the pandemic, the AOA's finances are in good shape thanks to the extra grants and pandemic support. Last year our income was very similar to previous years, with the main impact being that the casino grants were further apart and so the funds had to be stretched to last for longer periods.

### 1. Sport, Physical Activity and Recreation (SPAR; Alberta government) – source of grants for provincial sport organizations

By meeting all the criteria outlined in the funding and accountability framework we have continued to receive the SPAR grant at levels similar to previous years.

### 2. Casino: no new funding in 2021. We used the remaining casino funds and received a draw for 2022 August.

### 3. Other Grants:

- **Temporary Wage Subsidy**
- **Government of Alberta Covid Relief fund**
- **City of Red Deer Community Development Grant**

- the City of Red Deer grant went mostly to our Outdoor Adventure Program development (\$5000). Our goal is to establish a club in Red Deer that will have its own orienteering programs and events.

- We have applied for 3 additional grants for 2022 and are currently waiting to see if we can reach more areas.

### 4. Other Revenue:

The outreach programs were reduced because of the lack of school programs, but the community programs still had a good turnout.







## 2021 Highlights

- Thanks to all the club's organizers, many activities continued throughout the pandemic, including online programs and individual GPS orienteering.
- In-person events, kid's programs, and outreach programs, were still held during the year, while holding to COVID protocols.
- "Try it!" sessions were very successful (**270 new participants**) and resulted in some new members.
- Two coaching courses were held with both online and in person sessions (**14 coaches trained**).
- School programs were limited: 4 outreach school programs were completed
- **Summer camp partnerships** with Cochrane and Airdrie Rec centers and Hela Venture were very successful.
- 'All Sports One Day' was very popular with over 60 kids signed up.





## 2021 Highlights- Continued

- Mapping projects were less active but still ongoing. Thanks to Teresa W. for helping with the outreach mapping and Don B. for completing the Barrier Lake mapping project. EOOO mapping near Bruderheim had to be postponed but the hope is to complete it in 2022. Thank you to Don Riddle for the updates to the Beaver Lake map for the Alberta Championships.
- Officials' certification was moved online. A huge thank you to Marion O. who volunteered to administer and give guidance to the new officials.
- AOA Board completed policy reviews to meet Alberta Government requirements. Safe Sport framework and other policies were all updated. Safe Sport framework can be found here: <https://www.orienteingalberta.ca/safe-sport-framework.html>
- Improving ways to share information and resources, and support the orienteering community remains a high priority for AOA: e.g we were involved with the OC's national team selection policy workgroup, the new members committee and teachers resources planning workgroup.
- We are currently busy supporting the CROF 2022 events and are excited to finally see it happen.
- We are also proud of the continuing support of the new Saskatchewan Orienteering Association.

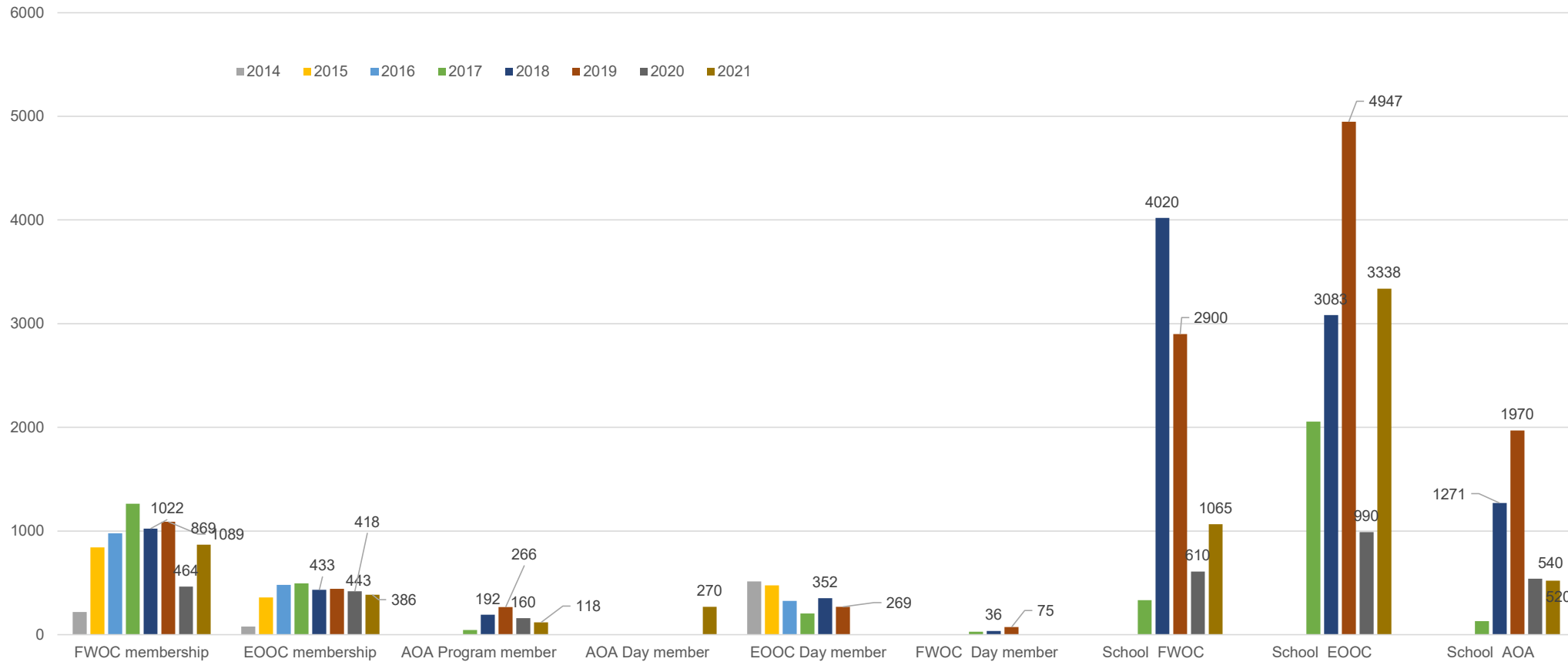

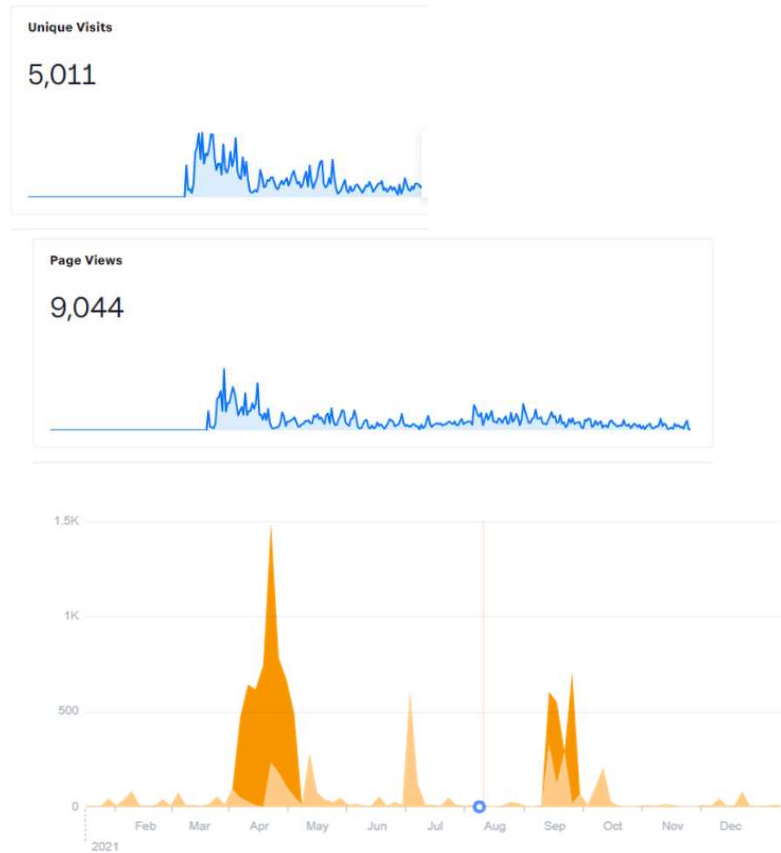

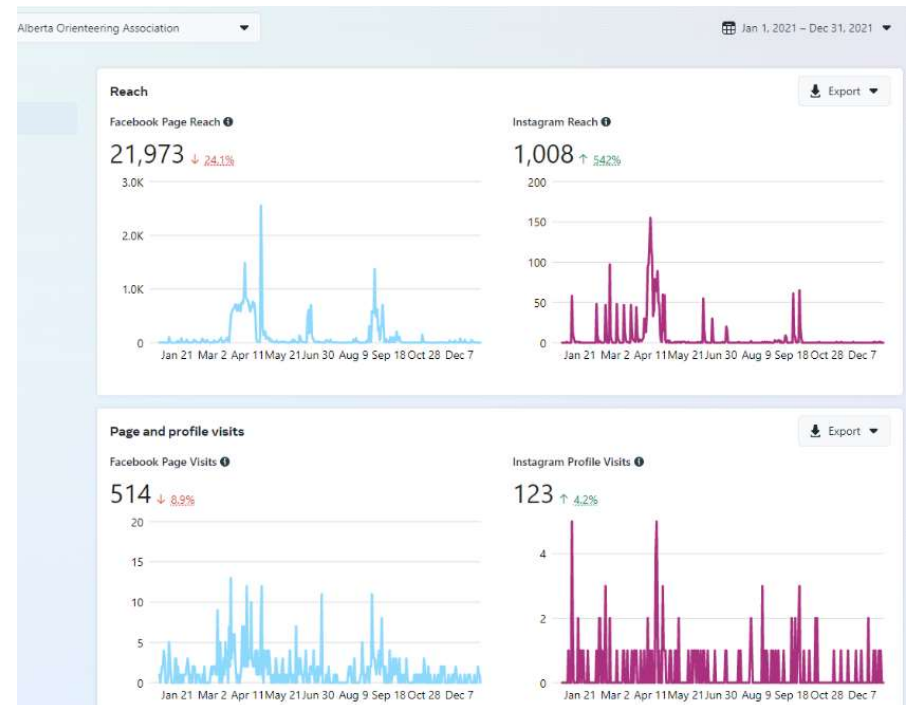

## 2021 in Review

- The 2021 books were audited by a Zoom conference call on April 6<sup>th</sup>, 2022. A big **"Thank You"** to Jean MacNaughton and Geraint Edmunds for all the work they did before and during the conference call to make the audit possible
- It has been another challenging year for the orienteering community.
- Our SPAR grant (Sport, Physical Activity and Recreation) remained the same as last year at \$41,743.00 of which we deferred \$8,500.00 to the 2022 year to give additional funding to training camps, officials and coaches training, etc. We look to be playing catch up in many areas.
- We were able to obtain an additional \$1,253.00 under the federal CEWS (Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy) program to help with Bogi's wages. An additional \$1,398.60 was obtained from the provincial government under their Alberta Small Business Relaunch Grant.
- To help with future relaunch efforts the AOA took out a CEBA loan (Canada Emergency Business Account) in the amount of \$60,00.00. Under the terms of this loan \$20,000.00 will be forgiven and no interest will be charged if we pay back the amount of \$40,000.00 by December 31, 2022.
- From a budgeted deficit of \$11,204 we were able to show a profit of \$799. This is due mainly to deferred and cancelled programs that could not be held due to COVID protocols.
- The AOA has been awarded a Casino to be held August 21 and 22 at the Cowboy Casino in Calgary.
- **AOA had a AGLC-requested AUDIT of the casino account in 2021**

# Treasurer's report, cont'd

## 2022 Budget

- The 2022 budget calls for a deficit of **-\$ 17,151**. This budget assumes there will be no change in our provincial funding and using only the deferred casino revenue of **\$5,198.79**. The provincial funding also includes the **\$8,500.00** deferred from the 2021 SPAR grant. We expect new casino funding to be available in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter after the August casino.
- Our primary focus in the coming year will be restarting programs and catching up on the programs missed or postponed due to COVID. All mapping projects hopefully will go forward this year.

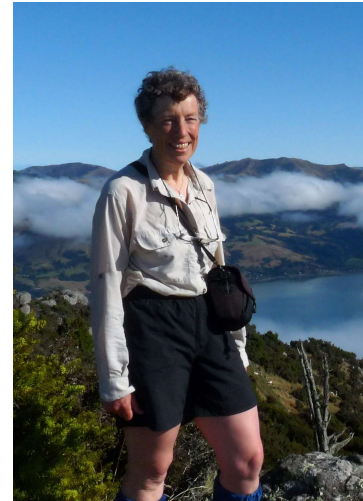

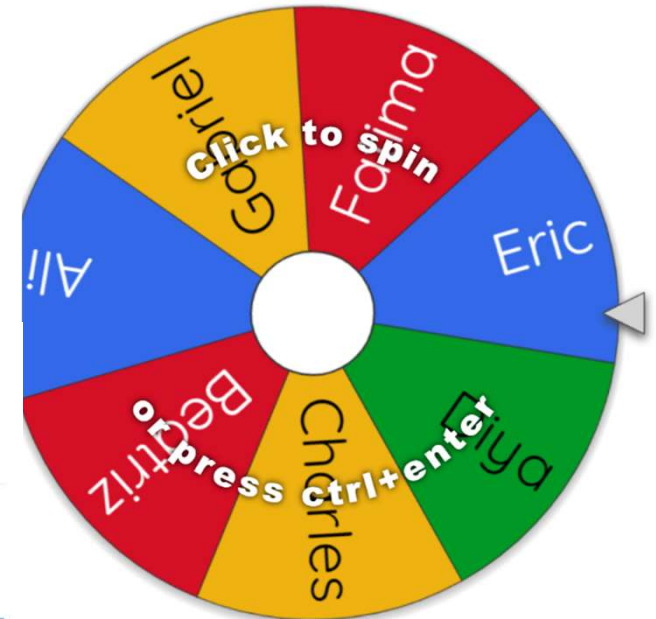
